The west front and the site of the Saxon westwerken, from the SW; the 'uneven' rubble work is the Saxon walling, which is extensive (see H.Taylor). Saxon work is also to be found in the N wall of the N transept up to eave level (not illustrated). 2. A closer detail of part of the north aisle/porticus from the west. 3. A general view from the SW with some of the Abbey buildings to the left (now a part of the adjoining school).
